What is Social Inclusion, Accessibility and Social Isolation?

Social inclusion is ensuring that everyone has barrier-free opportunities to participate in economic, social and political life. Social connection is a necessity for good wellbeing, and considered a major social determinant of health.

Accessibility means that barriers to participation are removed to allow for full participation in society. Accessibility barriers include physical, cultural and financial.

Social isolation occurs when people have low quantity or quality of contact with others. People experiencing social isolation often experience loneliness, which can be fleeting, situation, interpersonal or chronic. Social isolation is disproportionately impacts those who are most marginalized, and poverty has a profound impact on social inclusivity in our communities.

Who is impacted when people don't have social inclusion and access?

13.1% of Canadians report that they always or often feel lonely, and 1 in 4 report that they do not consistently have someone they can depend on when needed.

Loneliness especially impacts seniors, people who are widowed, those who have disabilities and those who are living on lower incomes.

Racialized people are also more likely to experience loneliness.

Barriers to accessibility are also a concern for Canadians, especially in rural areas where access to public transportation is less common.
